"THE GREAT CHASE" SEQUENCES

THE GREAT TRAIN ROBBERY — The Great Chase began in 1903 with pioneer director-photographer Edwin S. Porter's original venture into combining a story with all the excitement of the popular touring "Wild West" shows which featured the chase. "The Great Train Robbery" became the keystone for not only subsequent action films but for the ingenious use of camera and film editing as well. This, then, is the great granddaddy of The Great Chase.

DESPERATE ENCOUNTER — Edwin S. Porter's 1905 film was many years ahead of its time. Here is the prototype of the cops and robber theme which was actually shot on the streets of New York.

A GIRL AND HER TRUST — Around 1910 a fledging director, D. W. Griffith, added new refinements to the increasingly popular medium of motion pictures. His technique of following the characters closely with the camera heightened the suspense of the chase. DOROTHY BERNARD played the intrepid heroine.

WAY DOWN EAST - Now a complete master of his craft, Griffith's 1920 screen version of the successful stage melodrama "Way Down East" confirmed his genius if nothing but for the accomplishment of persuading LILLIAN GISH and RICHARD BARTHELMESS to actually perform in one of the most haz ardous chase scenes in motion picture history. Both Miss Gish and Mr. Barthelmess were exposed to the dangers of zero degree temperatures and the ice floes on the Connecticut River as they reenacted the plight of a forsaken girl who is saved from death by her faithful sweetheart.

THE COMING OF AMOS — Cecil B. DeMille's lavish settings for his princess-in-peril, JETTA GOUDAL, reflects the sophistication which was brought to the chase in the Twenties. NOAH BEERY's sneering elegance as the menace is offset by the bravura of rescuer ROD LA ROQUE.

DOUGLAS FAIRBANKS, SR. — Handsome, athletic and dare-devil supreme, Fairbanks stands alone for the flair and balletic grace he brought to the most difficult of stunts as he chased and was chased on land and sea. NOAH BEERY displays another type of menace in the sequence from "THE MARK OF ZORRO."

TO BE CONTINUED - The Serials - Heady exponents of the chase interrupted, the serial kept millions of viewers in the happy state of suspense from week to week. PEARL WHITE got off to an early start as a nerve tantalizer in 1914 in "The Perils of Pauline." RUTH ROLAND soon emerged to share the tension as she ended her weekly cliffhanging episodes in death-defying situations.

JUNGLE TREASURE - Made on location in the heart of the Amazon, an unsung and nameless actor encounters some monstrous threats as he pursues his quarry, a rare butterfly on a river infested with hostile natives, piranha fish and voracious crocodiles. The Brazilian jungle has its own breed of real-life menaces to thwart a dedicated scientist's chase.

TUMBLEWEEDS - William S. Hart - This was the last picture of the man who brought the most enduring of chases . . . bad cowboys versus good cowboys . . . into world prominence. The 1926 picture also set an all but unbeatable re-enactment of the famous Oklahoma land rush. Hart rode many chases, but this, made when he was 56, was his greatest.

THE GENERAL — Buster Keaton — Keaton was able to make full use of his acrobatic and comic skills in portraying the engineer of the Southern locomotive, The General. Based on a true incident which occurred during the Civil War, "The General" emerged as the screen's classic railroad chase. When the locomotive is "kidnapped" by Northern soldiers, Keaton doggedly sets out alone to retrieve it. MARION MACK supplies the love interest as the threatened Southern belle who becomes very much involved in the recapturing of the locomotive much to Keaton's everlasting glory.

As a warm-up, Miss Gish was first called up to wander about in a blinding blizzard to get to the river bank. Once there, she spent long hours cruising the river sprawled out on the freezing ice. The agony so often shown on her face was genuine...in terms of absolute realism, this sequence has seldom been equaled.

In a lighter vein, Buster Keaton performs some incredible feats atop a speeding locomotive in his 1927 comedy classic "The General." Keaton had formerly been a vaudeville acrobat, and this background enabled him to perform some hazardous footwork as he makes a swaying train a prop for his serio-comic envolvements. 
Miss Gish, one of the most ex-

This was actually a warming-up exercise as her ultimate destination was ride down the Connecticut River prostrated on an ice floe. interview that five lives were lost during the filming of the picture, and most of the actors and crew suffered from frostbite. 




